This year marks the sixth anniversary for the ASIST SIG III International Paper Contest on International Digital Libraries and Information Science & Technology Advances in Developing Countries. The International Paper Contest is one of the most successful programs SIG III runs each year. The papers submitted represent important developments in information science, and they serve to advance the information profession worldwide. In the past three years (2002-2004), we have attracted over 150 information professionals from 35 developing countries to participate in the International Paper Contest. Many of the papers have been published in library and information literature, including the *International Information and Library Review* and the *Bulletin of the American Society for Information Science and Technology*. In addition, contest winners often see advances in their professional careers. Their stories are posted on the ASIST SIG III website at <http://www.asis.org/SIG/SIGIII/>. This valuable opportunity would not be available without the financial support provided by all of our generous donors.

The funds raised will support two-year ASIST memberships for six to eight of the paper contest winners each year and cover expenses of the top winner(s) to travel from his or her home country to the ASIST Annual Meeting. International Conferences Calendar a Success

The New England and European Chapters together with SIG/III endeavoured to establish the International Calendar of Information Science Conferences, which was launched on July 23 and has been so far quite successful. Editing and moderation are secured by Caryn Anderson and Michel Menou. A few volunteers in the US and abroad are helping with the gathering of information, most notably J.K. Vijayakumar (known as Vijay to many, and former InfoShare award winner). Haworth press spontaneously offered a contribution of \$500 to help run the service in exchange of due acknowledgement, what was agreed. Funds are managed by the New England Chapter which is also overseeing the hosting.

Since 23 July 2005, the calendar has been visited by researchers and practitioners in over 65 countries, including: Argentina, Austria, Australia, Belgium, Bulgaria, Bahrain, Benin, Brazil, Botswana, Belarus, Canada, Chile, China, Colombia, Croatia, Czech Republic, Djibouti, Denmark, Dominican Republic, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hong

Kong, Hungary, Ireland, Israel, India, Italy, Japan, South Korea, Luxembourg, Morocco, Mexico, Namibia, Netherlands, Norway, Nepal, New Zealand, Oman, Peru, Papua New Guinea, Pakistan, Poland, Portugal, Romania, Russian Federation, Saudi Arabia, Sweden, Singapore, Slovenia, Slovak Republic, South Africa, Spain, Switzerland, Thailand, Tunisia, Turkey, Taiwan, United Arab Emirates, United Kingdom, United States, Venezuela, Vietnam.

At the time of writing this report there were over 190 events in the calendar. The web site is now receiving an average of approximately 200 sessions per day (a total of over 12,500 in the past two months). About half of the sessions are checks of the RSS feed, which is an encouraging sign that both a) people have subscribed and will therefore remain regularly connected to the calendar, and b). We continue to get new interest (some top referrals to the calendar come from links on a couple of popular blogs and other professional associations).

We plan to explore the idea of establishing a related blog which may help to facilitate communication among conference attendees to coordinate their attendance or comment on specific conferences, and to encourage communication among conference planners to coordinate scheduling.

Sue O'Neill Johnson's New Book



The monograph, "Leadership and Management Principles in Libraries in Developing Countries" is the result of the competition of the Leadership and Management Division of SLA in 2002-2003 when Sue O'Neill Johnson (Past chair of SIG III 2000 and 2003;

SIG-Member-of-the-Year Award winner for 2003) was co-chair of International Relations. The winner of the competition was Mr. Paiki Muswazi of Swaziland. Twenty papers were selected for publication. Editors were Sylvia Piggott, Chair of the Division, who administered the project; Wei Wei, who handled the details of publishing with Haworth Press, and also identified the publication as the 2002 volume of Science and Technology Libraries; and myself, who managed the marketing and outreach for the competition.

We've had two reviews: New Library World, Vol. 106, issue 3&4, 2005 by Mike Freeman, Hon. International Relations Officer, WAI CILIP, UK, and Portal: libraries and the Academy 5.1 (2005) 135-136 by Sha Li Zhang, Wichita State University Libraries.

The essays are by authors from 15 developing countries in Asia, Sub Saharan Africa, Eastern Europe and Central America. They represent a body of practical experience, problems, lessons, and techniques that can be shared and tried by others in developing countries. As Sha Li Zhang, reviewer, said, "The essays offer authentic observations and rich experience through the eyes of the authors...The leadership techniques...can be tracked from leadership roots in the developed world. For instance, Muhammad Yaqub Chaudhare and

Muhammad Umar Farooq's 'retreat but never surrender' and 'service without asking'; Grete Pashch's 'cautious but decisive' and Imo J. Akpan's 'lead by examples' all speak to the commonalities of leadership experience." The papers from Shivanthi Weerasinghe, Sri Lanka (a former winner of the ASIST SIG III International Paper Contest) on development of a web site for a commercial bank, Michael Kasusse on AIDS work in Uganda, and Muzhgan Nazarova on librarianship in Azerbaijan, all show the importance of library services as the backbone of local and national economic development. News from Previous Paper Contest Winner



Dr. Tariq Ashraf, one of the winners of the ASIST International Paper contest, year 2003, has recently joined Indian Institute of Management, Lucknow as Librarian. IIM-Lucknow is one of the most prestigious Institutes, established by government of India

offering both Diploma and Fellow programmes in Business Management.

Spread over 200 acres and situated in the capital city of Lucknow, Institute boasts of a library which is considered in India as pride of library profession.
